Facts of the Case: The plaintiff, a 47-year-old millwright for Armco Steel, sustained severe burns in an industrial accident at Armco's Kansas City plant. He sued the German manufacturer of the withdrawal/straightening machine he was working on at the time of the accident.

In the plant where the plaintiff worked, Armco uses a continuous casting process to produce six strands of steel, each of which is seven inches square and could be hundreds of feet long. These rivers of molten metal pass through the withdrawal/straightening machine, which straightens the molten metal, and then to the torch cutting section, which cuts the strands into billets, typically 20 feet in length.


Plaintiff was replacing a hydraulic cylinder as part of the routine maintenance of the machine when a weld securing a moveable arm on the machine broke. This caused the machine to collapse and the plaintiff was pinned at the throat between the moveable arm and the structure of the torch casting section.

The moveable arm was about 600m F. at the time, and it lay on plaintiff's chest for at least 10 minutes before plaintiff could be extricated. He suffered full thickness burns to his neck and upper chest, underwent several reconstructive surgeries and claimed he lost about one-half million dollars of future income.

Plaintiff contended the machine was defective because it could not achieve "zero mechanical state," a condition in which movement of the machine during maintenance and repair is not possible. He claimed this violated basic machine design principles which have developed since 1900.

Plaintiff also said the machine violated an ANSI standard first published in 1981. The machine was built in 1975, and defendants claimed the ANSI standard did not apply. But plaintiff said the ANSI standard called for retrofitting all existing machines to comply with the new standards within three years.

Defendants denied the machine was unreasonably dangerous. They also said the machine could have achieved zero mechanical state, but the plaintiff failed to comply with written "job safety analysis" standards adopted by the Armco plant, in order to get his job done faster.






